



**No. 1: First Avenue School**

Site of Arcadia’s first schoolhouse, a yellow clapboard building built in 1907. Located at the corner of First Avenue and California Street.

**No. 2: Original Arcadia City Hall**

First official Arcadia City Hall, dedicated July 13, 1918. Located at the northwest corner of First Avenue and Huntington Drive.

**No. 3: Arcadia County Park**

Once “Lucky” Baldwin’s racetrack, now a public park. Located at the southwest corner of Huntington Drive and Santa Anita Avenue.

**No. 4: Arcadia Woman’s Club**

The club house dates back to 1931. The Arcadia Historical Society can be traced back to this century-old club. Located at the corner of First Avenue and Diamond Street.

**No. 5: Chamber of Commerce**

Futuristic round building of mid-1960s quickly became the City’s geographic and civic hub. Located at 388 W. Huntington Dr.

**No. 6: Santa Anita Park**

“The world’s richest racetrack” opened to the public on Christmas Day 1934. Located inside the racetrack’s eastern admission gate.

**No. 7: Adams’ Pack Station**

The last remaining pack station in Southern California, still maintaining its original mission. Located at the station on Chantry Flat Road.

**No. 8: The Derby Restaurant**

The classic gathering place for horse-racing fans and sport insiders alike. Located at 233 E. Huntington Drive.

**No. 9: L.A. County Arboretum**

The 127-acre Arboretum occupies the heart of historic Rancho Santa Anita. Located at the Arboretum’s entrance.

**No. 10: Elias Jackson Baldwin**

“The outstanding individualist of his generation.” Located on the rose garden island separating Campus Drive and Huntington Drive, at Holly Avenue.

**No. 11: Depots, Hotel Oakwood**

Trains were a prominent part of Arcadia for generations. The Oakwood was “a city hotel in a frontier village.” Located at the Arcadia Transit Plaza.
